Are you at risk of having to move into a nursing home?

Are you currently in a hospital, rehab, or nursing home, and want to return to living in the community?

DRC can provide you with information about how to explore the possibility of re-entering the community, or how to stay in the community, by identifying what services and resources are available to support your living successfully at home.

DRC provides guidance for persons with a disability to obtain the essential skills and resources necessary to function in today's complex society, including:

- Benefits Application and Appeals such as SSI, SSDI, SNAP, etc.
- Search for Affordable and Accessible Housing
- Financial Management
- Learning to Access Public Transportation
- Civil Rights
- Self Advocacy

The majority of our staff identify as having a disability. Because of this, we are in a unique position to provide peer mentoring and support by sharing our personal and professional experiences as a person living with a disability.

Transition to Adulthood Program

Students aged 14 to 21 who have a disability and an IEP or 504 Plan face many challenges as they transition from student to adulthood.

The TAP program supports youth in gaining skills, knowledge and confidence in preparation for leaving high school, and is a resource to their family.

Students participate in social, educational and vocational skills building events that are fun and enriching.

Community Advocacy

We work closely with municipalities, businesses and service providers to address discrimination and barriers in our community. We continually advocate for legislation and funding of services and supports for people living with disabilities.
